## HEARING ON IMPORTANT LEGISLATION

Gentlemen:


A sub-committee of the Committee on Judiciary General of the Senate with Senator Mansfield as Chairman will hold a public hearing in Harrisburg on Tuesday, March 10th, at 2:00 P. M., in Room 300 State Capitol on Senate Bills 143 and 178.

Senate Bill 143 by Mr. Coyne would limit the employment of females to not more than six days in any one week or more than forty-four hours weekly or more than eight hours daily. The present law permits females to work ten hours a day and fifty-four hours weekly.

Senate Bill 178 by Mr. Salus provides that no minor under eighteen years of age shall be permitted to work more than forty-four hours weekly or eight hours daily or before 6:00 in the morning or after 8:00 in the evening, and not less than forty-five minutes allowed for the midday meal. The present law provides that with certain excepted hazardous occupations minors between the ages of 14 and 16 may be employed nine hours daily or fifty-one hours weekly providing they attend school eight hours weekly, which is included in the fifty-one hour total; minors between 16 and 18 may be employed without school attendance required except in certain hazardous occupations with no regulation of hours of work.

A large delegation of manufacturers is going to Harrisburg on the 10th inst. to appear at this hearing. If you will send a representative please advise us by telephone. If not, we urge you to write immediately to your Representatives and Senators expressing your opinion on this measure and also send a letter to this office stating your opinion so that it may be filed with the Senate Committee.
