Foundrymen Told How to Obtain Federal Business

Deal Directly ^{1/21/41}
With Government,
U. S. Officials Say

Three federal officials associated with national defense organizations or government services addressed the Reading Foundrymen's Association last night at a dinner meeting in the Berkshire Hotel. The 150 diners included many guests, members of the Reading Manufacturers' Association.

Speakers introduced by H. P. Good, foundry superintendent for the Textile Machine Works and president of the foundrymen's association, were Maj. W. S. Broberg, Philadelphia, and Lieut. W. H. Byers, of Philadelphia, and Edward Wyatt, of the labor division of the U. S. Defense Commission. Wyatt is stationed in this city, cooperating with manufacturers here in various phases of the commission's work.

Major Broberg, of the U. S. Ordnance Department, procurement division, told the members of the two associations of the tremendous volume of orders already placed, or being placed, for national defense operations. He emphasized, as "a most important detail," of relations between the department and manufacturers, that owners or operators of plants desiring government orders should contact the procurement division of the department.

'Deal With Government'

"Don't pay any attention to persons who profess to be salesmen, agents or jobbers, who promise to get you orders on a commission basis," Broberg said. "Deal with the government, and if you can meet the government's requirements, you will get government business."

Byers described in detail the functions of the procurement division in placing orders and handling materials for the ordnance department. Wyatt told of the work of training unskilled and semi-skilled men for service as skilled men in plants filling government orders.

Local Schedule Prepared

H. C. Cummings, secretary of the manufacturers' association, said a complete schedule of all machinery and tools available in this city and district for work on government orders has been prepared. The schedule covers the type, size and condition of all equipment and is expected to aid owners of plants in obtaining more federal business.

On Tuesday night, February 18, G. S. Adams, of the Mathieson Alkali Corporation, Cleveland, will address the foundrymen on "Cupola Grey Iron."
